Faith Leaders Urge Political Action on Climate Change



Francis in Laudato Si' — Caring for Our Common Home. Calling the encyclical "the most important document written in our lifetime" Patrick Carolan, Executive Director of the Franciscan Action Network emphasized Francis' statement that "We human beings above all need to change." The importance of becoming engaged politically was also emphasized by Carolan, Rabbi Katy Allen, President of the Jewish Climate Action Network, Rev. Dr. Jim Antal, President of the Massachusetts

Conference of the United Church of Christ and Christiana Leano, Director of Global Outreach for the Global Catholic Climate Movement (GCCM). Antal cited the role of civil disobedience in defeating the Keystone XL pipeline and mentioned that both he and Carolan went to jail to protest it. He also urged people to tell the leaders of their congregations and faiths to emphasize climate change in their worship and in the lives of their communities. As the crucial COP21 negotiations begin in Paris on November 30th, actions can be taken at many levels, including:

Pray for a strong universal climate treaty and for communities affected by climate disruption by joining the #Pray4cop21 online Prayer Chain between now and the end of COP21 on December 11th.

MASSACHUSETTS FAITH LEADERS TESTIFY IN SUPPORT OF PRICING CARBON



would bring transportation and heating fuels within the current cap and trade system and retain 20% of all revenues to fund measures to further reduce fossil fuel emissions. Vince Maraventano Executive Director of Massachusetts Interfaith Power & Light, Rev. Ray Selker of St. Anthony's Shrine, Boston, Rabbi Katy Allen, President of the Jewish Climate Action Network, Rev. Reebee Girash of Eliot Church of Newton, and Rev. Stephen Ayres of Old North Church in Boston, all testified in support of pricing carbon to capture its social and public health costs.

The last 6 months have seen major statements by the leaders of diverse faiths on the importance of acting on


Barrett, (D-Lexington) and Marc Pacheco (D-New Bedford) have both filed bills to put a price on carbon. The Barrett Bill, S1747, would provide rebates to taxpayers for all carbon fees collected. The Pacheco Bill S1786,

climate change. "If Protestant leaders can agree with the Pope, rabbis can agree with imams, and Black church leaders can agree with the National Association of Evangelicals on climate change, I hope and pray that the governor and the legislature can agree on these important bills," Maraventano told the committee. "The design of the particular carbon pricing mechanism is far less important than the costs of failure to adopt any ... mechanism. We must not let the perfect be the enemy of what is not only good, but also what is necessary," he added.

Climate change most hurts those who contribute the least to it—poor people and people of color. "There is a moral imperative to make the systemic changes needed to prevent this climate injustice," Maraventano

testified. Rev. Ayres said that the General Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts endorsed pricing carbon in 2013. Legislators, economists, business people, civic groups and environmentalists also testified. For more on the issue click here. 


